
At Brooklands, three other *little ones* came to see us, Tracey with her twin sons, Jack & Archie, and the other Tracey with her daughter Saskia.

If any mums have any old toys that they don't want and would like to contribute to my 'Toy Box', please bring them to the next event. Thanks **Jan**



CORRECTION

Neil has pointed out that in my list of cars designed by Dante Giacosa that I missed out the Fiat 130 saloon - a car that he has a particular interest in, owning 2!!

Giacosa was involved in the project, (it was designed by the Style Centre from around 1967) he had predicted that styling was contemporary, but would fall out of vogue very quickly, the influence being the USA and Mercedes, so the 130, though not 100% Giacosa, his fingers were in the pie".



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from the WORKSHOP bench (by James):

I can't remember the amount of times that I have found the headlights incorrectly fitted to Fiat 500's, sometimes just after a bulb change or even after a full restoration

First of all, let me remind you that headlight units for the Right Hand Drive cars are no longer available. The units were only made when the cars were sold new and for a short time afterwards. They have not been produced for many, many years so all the existing stock has long since been sold.

The units still available are of course Left Hand Drive units, with the asymmetrical dipping to the right (incorrect for this country) This in itself is no big problem, as lets face it, headlight on a 500 are so dim that they will never blind the oncoming traffic (they are hardly as powerful as 2 candles).

Most MOT stations will now accept these headlights, especially if you put a small bit of black tape on the lens so that the dipping is correct. In some cases it is worth talking to the tester before the test, explaining that this is not just to save money, but because the RHD lamps are no longer made.

The correct way of fitting is:


With the headlamp unit out of the car and ready to be assembled on the bench, fit the chrome rim, remembering to line up the hole at the bottom of the rim with dot on the bottom back of the lamp.

The headlight unit – reflector – has two adjusting bolts at the back these are for direction and dipping. Also a spring with a large ring attached.

Fit the unit into the car by inserting the little tongue (part of the lamp) into the slot on the left hand side of the headlight bucket of the front panel.

The two bolts (adjuster screws) should then protrude through the relevant holes in the bucket. Sometimes you will need to move the head of the screws slightly to fit through the holes, *but in no circumstances* remove the screws from the lamp and screw through the panel, This is what I find so often is done and by doing so the headlight can not be adjusted.

When the headlight is in position, then secure it by clipping the large ring attached to the spring onto the bracket on the side of the headlight bucket.



To adjust the dipped beams turn screw D (vertical adjustment) and screw E (horizontal adjustment) as necessary.

AMBERLEY (BY NESS):

This is me in my Noddy (no 25) last year at Amberley event. It was a corker of a day.

The annual Amberley Working Museum's Microcar and Scooter Day is a highly recommended annual event for the Fiat 500 Owner. The day is all about pre 1975 microcars from the 30s 40s, 50s, 60s and 70s, (even pre 1975 Fiat 126s/127s will be welcome with our Club at this one), and this really is our little cars' 'Day' to enjoy.

The setting is the Amberley Working Museum set is a beautiful (and I mean, beautiful!) part of West Sussex. It's a day's event and a convoy is usually organised at 8am from Farnham (Surrey) train station for those who would like to travel down 'as one'.

Part of the trip down entails stopping off at a lovely country pub for breakfast (fry up or cereal and orange juice – your choice and very reasonably priced) and we are always made to feel welcome by the owner.

The trip down is leisurely and just right for a 500's pace. You get to see balloon racing up above in the skies and oodles of rambling countryside – lots of sheep, cows and rubber duckies (ducks to you!) too. On the way home, I usually organise a stop off at a different country pub to enjoy a beer or two and enjoy the cricket on the green.

This event is a real 'picture on the front of a chocolate box' day out. Gorgeous countryside, loads to see at the museum and perfect if you want to bring the family down and have a picnic. Picnics, deckchairs and self catering is welcome if you want to bring a bottle or two of wine down to enjoy with your stilton at lunchtime! There's lots to enjoy at the museum and it really does 'take you back in time' to the turn of the century. There's even an old bus collection on display and old buses are up and running on the day to take you round the museum. Brick makers, printers and many other skilled manual workers demonstrate their skills from decades and centuries gone by and there are also several buildings displaying old equipment that will 'jog your memory'.

Remember the dial telephones from the 30s, 40s, 50s, 60s, & 70s? What about your mother's old washing machine, iron and a whole array of household goods from eras gone by? The list is endless of exhibits to see – you won't get bored – it's all there for you to go back in time.
